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SCHOLARSHIPS AND FINANCIAL AID

COMMUNITY COLLEGE – FOUR YEAR COLLEGES – TRADE & TECHNICAL SCHOOLS

The Career Center staff helps students pursue scholarships and distributes applications for financial aid. Scholarships are funded by various donors, businesses, and organizations. Awards range from \$100 to \$10,000 or more. Although there are some scholarship opportunities available to freshmen, sophomores and juniors mostly through competitions, the majority of the applications apply to seniors. To plan ahead, students of all grade levels need to be aware of these scholarship facts:

1. Scholarships are not granted automatically; the student must work, search, and apply for them.

One of the best local sources is the “Scholarship Weekly” published by the Career Center every week throughout the school year and distributed to all teachers and counselors. This same information can be found on the RHS web page under Career Center and Scholarships:

- The Internet is another fast-growing source of scholarship information. See page 5 for a list of helpful websites. You shouldn't have to pay for any scholarships. Be careful of scams. If you have questions about a source of scholarships that requests monies for help with scholarships, contact the Career Center.

2. A student-athlete entering college must meet specific NCAA academic requirements to be eligible for financial aid awarded by a Division I or II college to practice and compete on an intercollegiate Division I or II team during the first year of attendance. Go to:

3. An appointment to a military academy such as the U.S. Air Force Academy is considered to be a \$250,000+ scholarship. Further information is available at College Night, the Fall College Fair, through the Career Center and military recruiting offices. These are the academy admission deadlines:

Sophomore or Junior Year

- Contact an academy representative. An early contact with the academy representative may help in developing plans to meet all the requirements.

Junior Year

- Apply for a nomination through your Congressman.
- Take the SAT and/or ACT examination in June.

Senior Year (Fall)

- Take medical and physical aptitude tests as directed.

June

- Graduate from high school

July

- Enter academy

4. **The Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC)** offers competitive scholarships including complete tuition, fees, books, and a subsistence allowance. The value may exceed \$100,000 at some private colleges. Many public and private colleges throughout the country provide ROTC programs including OSU, U of O, University of Portland, Stanford, Harvard, the UC system and the California State system.
5. **Juniors** scoring in the top ½ percent of the PSAT in October will automatically be placed in competition for **National Merit Scholarships**. Juniors must register for the PSAT in the Career Center as soon as school opens in the fall. The test is only offered once a year.
6. Grants and/or low interest loans may be used to meet the costs of many trade and technical schools as well as the cost of community colleges and four-year colleges when there is a financial need. The lower the family income (as reported by IRS) and the higher the cost of the education, the greater the financial need.
7. The first step in financial aid is the application during senior year for state and federal grants. Even if an academic or athletic scholarship is a possibility, colleges expect qualified students to make application for these grants starting in October of the senior year. The **FAFSA** (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) and worksheets to help families complete the FAFSA are available at www.fafsa.ed.gov.
8. Some private colleges require additional financial aid information through what is called the **CSS PROFILE** form. For more information about this go to: <https://cssprofile.collegeboard.org/>
9. The following chart shows a simplified version of how financial aid packages are determined.

Cost of Attendance – EFC = Financial Need

| | School A | School B | School C |
|------------------------------------|----------|----------|----------|
| Cost of Attendance | \$10,000 | \$40,000 | \$60,000 |
| Expected Family Contribution (EFC) | \$5,000 | \$5,000 | \$5,000 |
| Financial Need | \$5,000 | \$35,000 | \$55,000 |

Institutions will offer financial aid packages made up of possible grants, work/study, and loans based on financial need indicated above.

SCHOLARSHIP AND FINANCIAL AID CON'T

10. College financial aid offices deal with private scholarships differently. *Ex:* If you receive a \$500 Booster Club Scholarship, some schools will deduct this amount from the *loan* portion of your package, others will deduct it from a **grant**. Ask your prospective schools before you make your final college choice.
11. The two most common factors considered in granting scholarships are academic ability (GPA, SAT/ACT scores, class rank, and coursework), and character (activities, personality, and recommendations). Another factor may be financial need.
12. Earning a bachelors degree in three years instead of the traditional four years may reduce college costs. Students may earn college credits in high school by dual enrollment at Roseburg High School and Umpqua Community College. Another option is to receive credit by taking Advanced Placement (AP) courses and achieving a certain score on the exams given in May of each high school year. Some schools also offer three-year degree programs that may include summer classes.
13. Beware of scholarship scams. You may receive letters indicating that you have been “selected” for a “free” consultation/meeting for scholarship or financial aid assistance. They may schedule this meeting at an out-of-town location. Any further information you may need after the initial “free” meeting will cost you financially. **There is no need to pay for scholarship/financial aid help when there is excellent FREE help available elsewhere. WHEN IN DOUBT, CALL THE CAREER CENTER!!**

COLLEGE-BASED SCHOLARSHIPS

- About 80% of scholarship monies come from the colleges. A large portion of those monies are based on a student's cumulative grade point average (GPA) and standardized test scores (SAT/ACT).
- Some college-based scholarships students automatically apply for with an application for admission. Other scholarships a student must complete a separate scholarship application. It is important to check with the college(s) that a student interested in to find out what the process is for scholarships as it varies from college to college.
- In almost all cases, a student must complete a FAFSA in order to qualify for college-based scholarships.

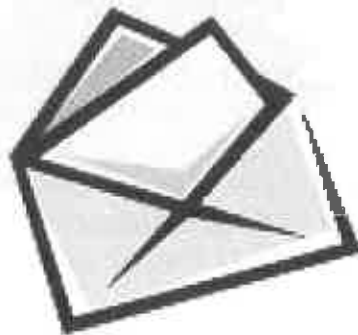

LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION

- Letters of recommendation are absolutely crucial in the selective college admission and scholarship application process. Some employers also request them.
- Colleges already know the student's GPA and test scores from transcripts submitted. They are looking for personal insights about the student, the special characteristics that set the applicant apart from others, qualities that a transcript does not reflect. Teachers, counselors, coaches or club advisors who know the student VERY WELL are the best sources of effective letters.
- Request letters from a variety of teachers and coaches. This will better demonstrate a balance of interests and your strengths in several areas, not just one subject. The most selective colleges will want to see letters written by teachers of your college prep classes (foreign language, AP/CC classes, etc.) who have witnessed your academic strengths. Do not include letters written by family members or peers.
- Request letters ***at least two weeks in advance of the date needed.*** Not only is this a courtesy to the very busy people often asked, but it avoids the stress of rushing at the last minute or not being able to write it at all. Remember, the most successful letters are ones where the writer is able to take the time to make the letter unique as opposed to the "cookie cutter" letter that sounds like all the others.
- **If the letter is to be mailed**, be sure to give the writer an addressed, stamped envelope.
- To help the people you will ask to write the best possible letter of recommendation for you, supply them with the following documents: ***Request for Recommendation, Parent Brag Sheet, Self Evaluation, and Activities Chart*** found on the following four pages. You may also pick-up copies of these forms in the Career Center.

SCHOLARSHIP TIPS

In many cases scholarship selection committees will only know what you tell them on an application. You want to give the committee the best impression. The tips below should help you do that.

1. Plan ahead!
2. Complete the application at least a day before the due date.
3. Do a rough draft.
4. PROOFREAD! If you bring your application to the Career Center several days before the due date, we can read it over and make suggestions.
5. DOUBLE CHECK that you have EVERYTHING that is requested i.e. transcripts, letters of recommendations etc.
6. WORD PROCESS FINAL COPY!!! Most scholarship selection committees give preference to word processed applications.
7. Make a title page.
8. Assemble, staple or paperclip or put in a folder, as directed.
9. Produce an application that looks as professional as possible.
10. If you receive a scholarship, a "Thank You" note is appropriate.

WRITING ESSAYS FOR SCHLARSHIPS

Before You Start

The way you choose to write reflects your power of persuasion and organization, style, and mastery of written English. Writing a good essay is critical to a successful scholarship application. Consider the following:

- Follow directions.
- Do not use decorative or colored paper.
- Neatness counts. Word process as much as possible.
- Do not use acronyms until you have used the entire title once, with the acronym in parentheses.

Brainstorming Ideas

You want to stand out with your essay in a positive way. The following questions may help you search out personal qualities and experiences that can be used in essay topics:

- In what ways are you unique?
- What are your leadership qualities?
- Do you take initiative?
- Are you a volunteer or helper?
- Have you received special recognition?
- What are your major accomplishments?
- Does any attribute, quality, skill distinguish you from everyone else?
- What was the most difficult time in your life and why? How did your perspective on life change as a result?
- Have you ever struggled for something and succeeded? What made you successful?
- How have your favorite books, movies, works of art etc. influenced your life?
- What are some of the words that people who know you in various capacities use to describe you?

SCHOLARSHIP TIPS CON'T

Writing The Essay

After you have brainstormed, begin writing with the following in mind:

- Can you keep the reader's interest from the first word? The essay must be interesting.
- Use an active voice.
- Use imagery and clear, vivid prose.
- Always remember – essays must have beginnings, middles, and endings – that is, an introductory sentence, some development of that concept, and a concluding sentence.
- REVISE, REVISE, REVISE
- Check and double-check grammar and spelling. Have someone proofread for you. Don't just depend on the spellchecker.
